GEORGE WHITMAN'S HOUSE DESTROYED

Edward Colimore reports in the *Philadelphia Inquirer* (January 2, 1995) that George Whitman's Stevens Street house in Camden, New Jersey, which was about to undergo restoration as an historical site, was decimated by a fire in September. This is the house Walt Whitman lived in from October, 1873, until March, 1884, when he purchased his Mickle Street home. He lived in this house while preparing the Centennial edition of *Leaves of Grass*, *Two Rivulets*, *Specimen Days*, and the 1881 edition of *Leaves*. He entertained many guests at the Stevens Street house, including Oscar Wilde. Nothing remains but charred rubble.
