JON ANDERSON's most recent book of poems is *Death & Friends*, available from the University of Pittsburgh Press. A former member of the Writers Workshop of The University of Iowa, he lives and teaches in Portland.

JOHN BATKI has published fiction in *The New Yorker*, and poetry in *Poetry*, *December* and other magazines. He is the translator of a volume of poems by Attila Jozsef, and co-editor of *New Hungarian Poets*.

JAMES CRENNER lives in Geneva, New York and teaches for Hobart College. He has published a book of poems, *The Aging Ghost*, and his poems have appeared in such magazines as *Poetry* and *The Atlantic*. He edits *The Seneca Review*.

RALPH DICKEY, a former editorial assistant for *The Mark Twain Papers*, now is teaching for SEEK in Syracuse.

WILLIAM DICKEY's new book of poems, *More Under Saturn*, will be published by Wesleyan University Press in the fall. His earlier books are *Of the Festivity*, which was awarded the Yale Younger Poets Award by judge W. H. Auden, and *Interpreter's House* (Ohio State University Press). He lives in San Francisco.
