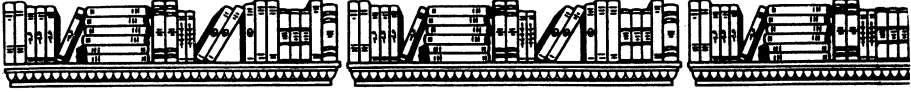
HELEN VENDLER is Porter University Professor at Harvard. Her most recent books are *Soul Says*, *The Given and the Made* and *The Breaking of Style*.

BRIAN YOUNG is currently teaching at Columbia College in Chicago. Other poems have recently appeared in *American Letters*, *Commentary* and *Volt*.



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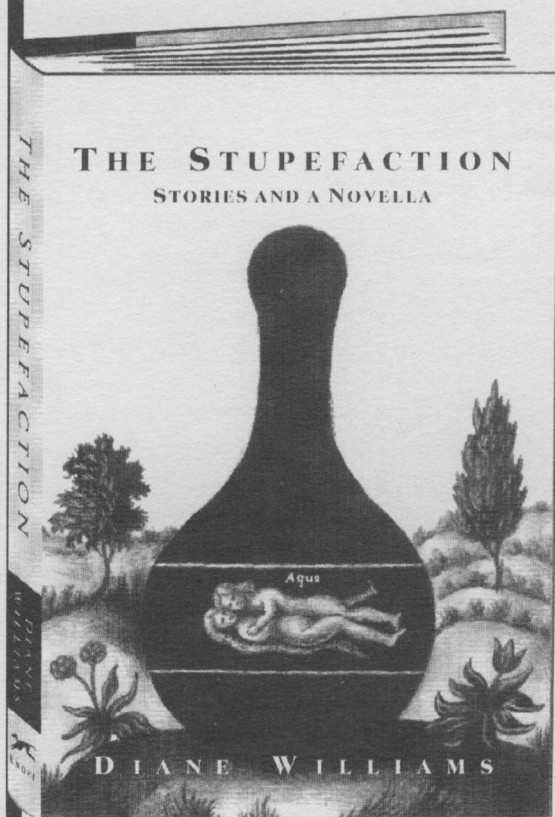
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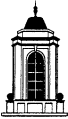
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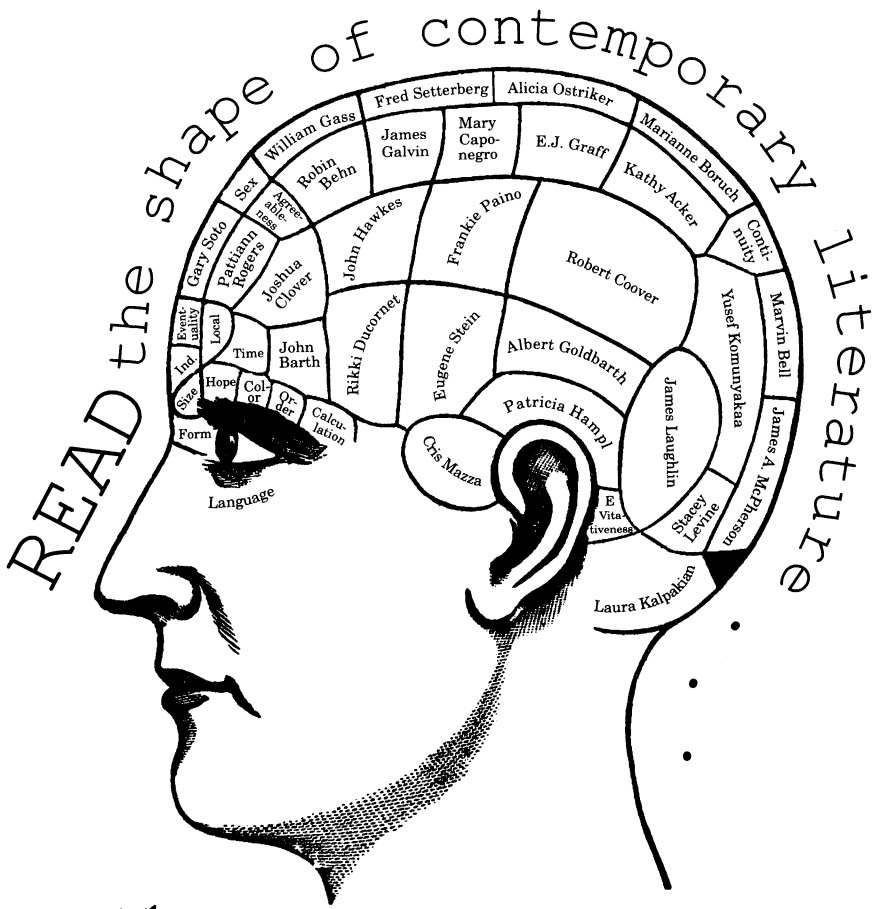
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
